### English Conditionals Explained: A Study Guide, by Susan Mazur

### **Examples of each type of Conditional:**

Take a look at how the Verbs change form in each one.

## **Zero (A rule or something that never changes):**

- → If it is sunny, the kids usually go out to play.
- → If I have some free time, I usually read a book.
- → If she has the chance, she takes a nap.
- → If they <u>sleep in</u> on the weekend, they <u>feel</u> lazy.
- → If a person doesn't eat or sleep, they eventually die.

# First (A real possibility in the future):

- → If it is sunny tomorrow, the kids will go out to play.
- → If I have some free time, today, I will read a book.
- → If she <u>has</u> some free time later, <u>she will</u> take a nap.
- → If they sleep in this Saturday, they will feel lazy.
- → If you don't eat or sleep, you will eventually die.

## Second (An unreal or imagined situation about the present; something that cannot be changed):

- → If it were sunny today, the kids would go out to play.
- → If I had some free time today, I would read a book. If I had more free time, I would read more.
- → If she <u>had</u> more free time, she <u>would take</u> a nap / she <u>would take</u> more naps.
- → If you gave me a sandwich or anything to eat, I'<u>d</u> eat it right now. I'm so hungry!

#### Third (An unreal or imagined situation about the past; something that cannot be changed):

- → If it <u>had been</u> sunny yesterday, the kids <u>would have gone</u> out to play.
- → If I had had some free time yesterday, I would have read a book.
- → If she <u>had had</u> more free time yesterday, she <u>would have taken</u> a nap.
- → If they had slept in last Saturday, they would have felt lazy.
- → If I <u>hadn't eaten</u> that sandwich, I think I <u>would have fainted</u> from hunger! I hadn't eaten anything for twenty-four hours before that!
